How do I sign up and keep track of the Summer Reading Challenge on Beanstack?



Scan the QR code to the right and create an account or log in to your account from last summer. If your child is not reading by themselves, you can register for the Pre-Reader Challenge. Participants earn one raffle ticket per completed badge: activities are called badges on Beanstack.

Log your child's activities through their Beanstack account and enter your raffle tickets into the prize baskets! Any participant who completes all 16 activities by August 5th will receive a Summer Reading T-shirt.

My child doesn't read yet, why should I participate?

Early Literacy is all about learning and practicing skills that help children get ready to learn to read. It is never too early to start practicing these skills, as children are learning from the moment they are born!

This is too easy/hard for my child...

Birth to five is a huge developmental range: that's why we have included activities that can be adjusted to fit the needs of your child. Make it as easy or challenging as you would like!

For example, "Find a triangle, a circle, and a square":

- For a younger baby, use a 3D object like a block to show them the shape and let them touch it and play with it.
- For a toddler, when reading together ask them to find a triangle on the page.
- For a preschooler, ask them to find triangles in everyday objects and talk to them about the different kinds of triangles.
